I live next door to the best **ice-cream parlour** in town — a mixed blessing, as I have to watch my figure.

Gianni's Gelato is an old, **family-run** business. At first, Gianni sold **hand-made** vanilla and chocolate ice cream from a **cart**. His sons upgraded to a motorized **van**, adding strawberry and pistachio to the range of **flavours**. Today, customers are spoiled for choice. You can find all the Italian classics, from **amarena** to **zuppa inglese**. The brothers have created lots of new flavours, too, including my current favourite: lime and black pepper. To cater to British **taste**, they also serve **Knickerbocker Glory** and other **delicious** old-fashioned ice-cream **sundaes topped with** plenty of **whipped cream**.

Quality comes at a price, of course. Gianni's **frozen treats** cost £3.50 a **scoop**. A half-litre **takeaway tub** costs £10. But cheaper, **mass-produced** ice cream simply doesn't compare with the **freshly made artisanal** kind.

If ice cream tastes very good, you can say it is **tasty**, **delicious** or, very informally, **yummy**. If it's **mouth-watering**, it looks or smells so good that you want to taste it.

Ice cream made from milk is **creamy**. If it contains nuts, it can be **crunchy**. Cones and wafers should be **crisp** or **crispy**. Ice cream usually tastes **sweet**, but some new flavours (such as Gianni's lime and black pepper) may be **tart** or **zesty**.

Ice cream contains a lot of calories, so unfortunately, it's always **fattening**.
