1. Birthday plans

Olivia has met up with her friend Jules for lunch in a cafe.

Jules: You'll never guess who's playing The O2 on your birthday.

Olivia: Oh, who? Justin Bieber? Miley Cyrus?

Jules: Wrong! I'll give you a clue. (sings) "Oh! oh! oh! oh! I've got a love that keeps me waiting."

Olivia: No! Really? The Black Keys. Oh, my God! Are there any tickets left?

Jules: (laughs) I take it that you'd like to go, then.

Olivia: Yes! Have you got tickets?

Jules: No, not yet. But there are some left, and we can book them right now if you want. Are you sure you're not doing anything else then? It is on a school night. It says the doors open at

Olivia: I'm sure! I'll take the afternoon off. What about you?

Jules: I'll just leave work a bit earlier. I've got so much overtime anyway.

- When a band or singer performs at a venue (Veranstaltungsort), you can say they are playing it / there.
- The O2, or The O2 arena, is an indoor stadium at the centre of The O2, a large entertainment complex in London. It is named after its main sponsor, the telecommunications company O2.
- When you assume (annehmen) something, based on another person's behaviour, you can say: I take it that... It is another way of saying, "I suppose..." or "It sounds to me like...".
- School night means "an evening during the week on which people wouldn't normally stay up late, because they have to go to work the next day".
- When talking about the time, speakers of British English often leave out "past" when they mean "half past". Half six means "half past six".
- If you need time away from work, you can ask for / ask to take "time off" or the afternoon / day off.



2. Best seats

Jules and Olivia are still in the cafe trying to book tickets on Jules's smartphone.

It looks like there aren't any seated tickets Jules: left near the **stage**. And it says here that level 4 is not recommended for people who are afraid of heights.

Olivia: What kind of seats did you have when you saw Paolo Nutini there?

Jules: We were standing.

Could you see anything? Olivia:

It wasn't too bad, actually. The arena's got a Jules: **sloping** floor.

Olivia: I wouldn't mind having a comfy seat. I'm

not 16 any more.

Jules: Look! There are seats here in block 102. That's pretty close to the stage. And anyway, there are **ginormous** screens. You can watch

everything on them.

Olivia: OK. See if there are two tickets there, then.

Hang on. Yes. £77 each. Jules:

- At most concerts, you can choose between "standing tickets" and seated tickets.
- The stage is the raised platform on which bands or soloists perform.
- Level 4 of The O2 arena is high up and very steep. People who are **afraid of heights** will feel nervous and uncomfortable watching a concert from the seats there.
- When a floor surface (Oberfläche) is higher at one end than the other, you can say it is sloping.
- **Comfy** (*ifml.*) is a shortened form of "comfortable".
- At concert venues, the seats are often organized in groups, called blocks.
- Ginormous [dʒaɪˈnɔːməs] (UK ifml.) is another word for "very big" or "huge". It is a combination, or blend, of the words "gigantic" and "enormous".

3. When and where?

It's the day of the concert. Jules calls Olivia from work to arrange a time and place to meet.

Jules: Hi, Olivia! It's Jules. Happy birthday!

Olivia: Thank you.

Jules: Did you get any good presents?

Olivia: Yeah, my best **mate** got me tickets to see my favourite band. I'm so excited about tonight.

Jules: *(laughs)* So, when should we **meet up? Do you want to** eat before or after the concert?

Olivia: Before. **Shall we** just eat there? A colleague was telling me about all the restaurants at The O2.

Jules: Yeah, that's right. I think there are about 30 **or something.**

Olivia: **How about** meeting at the main entrance at six? That should give us enough time to eat and find our seats.

Jules: OK. I'd better get back to work. See you there.

- Mate (UK, Aus.) is an informal word for "friend".
- When you meet up with a person, you meet him or her by arrangement.
- When you ask a friend what he or she would like to do, you can say: Do you want to...? "Would you like to...?" is the more polite alternative.
- Shall we...? or How about + -ing? are used to make suggestions.
- You can say or something when you are not sure that what you have said is correct: "I think she forgot her bag or something."
- I'd better is the short form of "I had better". You can use it to tell people what you think you should do.

4. Best ever

The concert is over. Jules and Olivia have gone to a bar to have a drink.

Jules: That wasn't bad, was it?

Olivia: Not bad? It was brilliant! It's the best concert I've ever been to.

Jules: Most bands aren't as good **live**, but The Black Keys are even better.

Olivia: I know. My feet hurt from dancing so much. I don't think there was anyone there who wasn't **on their feet.**

Jules: What did you think of the **support band**?

Olivia: Really great!

Jules: I know. Everything was so good: the lighting, the atmosphere, everything.

Olivia: The best bit was the **encore**, though. The crowd just went mad.

Jules: It was so cool. So, what do you want to drink?

- When Olivia says it's the best concert she's ever been to, she uses the present perfect because she is talking about her experience up to now.
- A live performance is one in which musicians perform before an audience. Here, "live" [laɪv] is an adjective.
- Another way of saying that people are standing is to say that they are on their feet.
- The **support band** or support act (*N. Am.* opening act) at a concert is the band (or group) that performs before the main act.
- An encore ['pŋkoː] is an additional short piece performed at the end of a concert.


